# Middle school site takes step forward

The likelihood of houses being built opposite Bredon Hill middle school has greatly increased following a review by Wychavon district council.

Councillors this month added the site to those regarded as suitable for development over the next 20 years.

Consultations will follow from 6 August to 14 September, including an exhibition in Beckford on Wednesday 5 September.

If then confirmed by the district council, this would establish the principle that houses could be erected there, but any scheme would still have to win approval regarding issues such as design, housing mix, and access.

The site is one of several around Ashton where development had previously been ruled out, in this case because its ownership was unknown.


Then, during last year's consultation, landowner David Eaton came forward with a plan for 25 homes – 11 of them affordable housing – plus off-road parking and a turning loop for buses.

### Autumn expo to give public another say

As a result, a planning officer recommended that 12 houses might be built in an area about half that proposed by Mr Eaton.

This was approved by councillors preparing the South Worcestershire. Development Plan, and on 3 July a full Wychavon meeting agreed to include the smaller site in the next consultative stage.

This was despite earlier parish council concerns about traffic in the area. It was one of around 100 new sites in Wychavon proposed by owners for development. Most were rejected, including one between Rockland House and Little Owl Farm, and another between Back Lane and Beckford Road. Land at the corner of The Groaten and Back Lane had already been included for six houses, although as chairman Gerry Barnett told the parish council this did not imply that the owner would wish to sell.

# Allotments win interest from village schools

Moves to create Ashton allotments are beginning to bear fruit - if not yet vegetables - the parish council has been told.

Frank Moore, the councillor behind the scheme, said 23 people had put their names forward, and interest could go wider.

"We have both schools interested, particularly the middle school," he said.

"And there is a suggestion we have a community allotment. Non-gardening members, people who cannot still garden, may like to go down there."

Keith Marshall has been appointed as chairman of an allotment association, with Sarah Sunderland secretary. A publicity campaign is planned for September's village fete.

But not all the groundwork has proceeded smoothly.

The only site available are the two acres offered by Richard and Christine Shaw who bought Ashton Garden Plant Centre on the A46 last year.

Neighbour Stephen Spires of Brooklands handed a letter to the parish council, complaining of lack of consultation, and objecting to the use of the land and to the possible lighting of bonfires there.

Cllr Moore said alternative access routes were being investigated, and the association could decide to prohibit bonfires.

# Open Gardens raise £7,000 for church and village hall

## Rare footage of Ashton celebrations now online

Villagers can now watch past royal celebrations in Ashton online.

The 1953 Coronation party and fete was recorded by local farmer, the late Tom Archer.

This has been put to music -They're Changing Guard at Buckingham Palace - by his youngest son John, who grew up in Ashton and now works as a TV and film producer.

The second portion of the film, *The Secrets of Bredon Hill*, recalls the Queen's Silver Jubilee celebrations of 1977.

Farmer-turned-author Fred Archer, Tom's younger brother is seen watching the Jubilee procession parade up past his home at Stanley Farmhouse, opposite the Star Inn.

The film ends with footage of the Silver Jubilee bonfire on Bredon Hill.

#### **Footways under scrutiny**

County councillor Adrian Hardman has dashed hopes that the footway on The Groaten might be extended toward the A46. It would cost £150k for little usage, he told the parish council.

But he did promise to press for improvement of

the footway to Willow Close in the next financial year, and said that work should be carried out in July to stop further erosion to the verge outside Rookery Nook.

He also hoped the village's speed-activated signs would be put up soon.

#### Tidy up site, owner urged

Wychavon has asked the owner of Willow Cottage, William Gilder, to clarify his intentions for the site following the latest refusal of a planning application.

The council said that approval of an earlier plan for a second property was "a compromise" based on

the hope that it would lead to improvement of the site and the cottage. The later plan was similar to others previously rejected, and the council could refuse to accept repeat applications.

It asked that the cottage should be repaired to prevent further deterioration.

## Fete looks forward with look to past

An expanded programme is due to be unveiled for the revitalised Ashton fete and show on Saturday 8 September.

Organisers plan to send details and entry forms to every house before the end of the school term.

The 82 show classes ranging from marrows to monsters, include home baking, wine-making and photography.

The entire programme has a retro theme.

"The idea is to put on a good old-fashioned fete for all the family," said Carol Reeve.

Entertainment includes a demonstration by TV stunt dogs, with a question and answer session with their trainer to follow.

Dance school DeNovo will perform, and there will be alpacas, army vehicles, a barbecue and games.

Organisers hope to set up an inter-village tug of war.

Books, DVDs, music, toys and china - but not clothing - are wanted for the used goods stall, and helpers will be warmly welcomed.

In the evening there will be music in the marquee with the Crazy 88s, pork baps, real ale and cider.

Meanwhile, raffle tickets are available from The Star and committee members due to call door-to-door to win £500 cash or prizes including a flat screen TV.

### Local sourcing wins Star award

The Star has long been known for sourcing its pork from its family farm at Grafton.

Now environmental group Transition Evesham Vale has recognised its support for many local producers by giving the pub its 30/30 accolade. This means that at least 30% of its ingredients come from within a 30-mile radius.

"our other meat is supplied by local butchers from local herds, and our vegetables by Pershore Produce who gather their supplies from within the Vale." Vicky Lawson said.

"The fish still come from the Cornish coast three times a week, but at least it's completely fresh, and we are working on being the first pub to get an award for over 70% of our ingredients coming from the Vale."

World Food Nights at 7pm on the last Thursday of the month continue with an American theme in July, Australian in August - hopefully outside on the barbie - and Spanish in September.

Menus are displayed a month in advance, with a 3-course menu of at least ten dishes and a free themed drink.

From 5 to 9pm on Tuesdays the pub offers two dishes from the Star Classics menu for the price of one. Booking is essential for all the above.

As usual, the Star will hold a beer and cider festival over the August Bank Holiday weekend when it hopes to offer an extra ten ales and four ciders. Families are welcome.

### WI backs call for midwives

Ashton WI members have voted unanimously to support the employment of more midwives.

They were told there was a national shortage of trained midwives, and if agreed by others, the resolution will go forward for debate at the annual meeting at the Albert Hall.
