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First school's "Imaginarium"


Parent power has meant a fantastic new outdoor learning space for village children

PARENT power has meant that our First-School's new £13,000 outdoor learning space has cost only half what it would have without help.

Six months of planning, fund-raising, painting and building has seen the completion of an "Imaginarium" at Ashtonunder-Hill First School.

The project received a major boost from a Big Lottery Grant of £10,000 but as parent Claire Kirke said: "My best guess is that it would have cost us twice as much without the parents volunteering their time and materials."

The "Imaginarium" is the brainchild of parent Cheryl Firkins, a land-scape architect, who said: "The school had a vision to create a multinature area based around an outdoor classroom and



invited parents to a brainstorming session.

"A plan was drawn up featuring new spaces inspired by mini beasts, plants and the natural environment all set along a discovery trail leading from the school buildings into the quiet garden and out onto the playing field, ending at the outdoor classroom."

Many parents put themselves forward to help with the project to ensure it was created on time and to a tight budget.

An outdoor classroom is the focal point of the Imaginarium, providing a learning environment that can be used throughout the warmer months. Mrs Kirke added: "The Imaginarium will continue to evolve. We have ordered outdoor musical instruments and are eagerly awaiting their arrival."

Head teacher Bryony
Baynes said: "The
Imaginarium has
opened up many new
opportunities by
providing a stimulating
and exciting environment for the children
to enjoy the great
outdoors.

"At the school we encourage the enjoyment of nature through frequent visits to Forest School. Now they can continue that learning in the playground."

The children have recently raised £1,300 through a sponsored walk. This money will be used to create fantastical creatures for the Imaginarium.

The Imaginarium also includes a 'beach area', a fort, discovery zones, and a bug hotel which has been created by the children and many insects have already taken up residence.

Farm Life **Charles Archer**

What an unusual year! WE started with drought with the difficulties it brought and then rain, rain and still more rain. No one can remember a year with such consistently unsettled weather. It is unprecedented in living memory. Harvest was difficult or impossible with some

crops left in the ground and little signs of a window of opportunity to gather them in. The quality of the cereal crops harvested was poor and the yields were low, resulting in very little quality grain available for seed sowing. There are many thousands of acres in our local area that have not been sown this autumn due to wet and waterlogged fields. Those fields that have been planted have bare patches due to standing water and slugs happily munching on any germinating shoots.

Decisions will be made for future sowings as and when conditions allow. Hundreds of acres of potatoes have been lost due to the crop just rotting in the ground. Livestock producers have an abundance of grass and some reasonable hay and silage in store to feed their animals throughout the coming winter. However, straw for bedding is in short supply. All this adds up to increased prices for both the producer and consumer alike.

Cut your Fuel Costs!!



VILLAGERS in Ashton are being encourage to participate in an energy-switching scheme which could help them make "substantial" savings. Councillor Frank Moore reported at the recent parish council meeting that Wychavon's chosen partner for energyswitching scheme was "Ichoosr", a Dutch company which, with the support of Wychavon, will pamphlet the region for subscribers. Then, on the basis of anticipated numbers, the company will negotiate with major gas and electricity suppliers. The savings are said to be substantial and Frank recommended that the whole village be encouraged to participate when the pamphlet arrives, particularly as it will be organised and supported by Wychavon.

Plant Centre set to grow with new farm shop and tea room

ASHTON Garden Plant Centre has been granted planning permission for a new shop at the nursery on the Cheltenham Road.

The shop will be located near to the entrance to the site and will incorporate a tea room and farm shop.

The owners, Richard and Christine
Shaw together with their youngest son
Matthew, have already started to
design the interior and to look for local
suppliers of quality produce for them
to sell. The small refreshment area
will provide drinks and snacks to
customers with views across to
Bredon Hill.

Richard said: "We are all very excited about receiving the planning permission as it enables us to expand our offering and provide a high-quality

facility that we believe, from talking to our customers, is needed. Hopefully it will create employment for local residents too. We anticipate construction will start early in the New Year." Christine added: "If anyone wants to see the plans, please just pop into the shop and we'll show them to you."

- *Thursday January 10th to Friday January 11th.
- *Friday January 11th to Saturday January 12th.

Christmas trees can be recycled between January 3rd and January 17th at local sites including Evesham Country Park at Twyford, The Plant Centre at Knowle Hill and Three Springs Garden Centre at Pershore.

DESPITE the wettest summer in living memory, Ashton-under-Hill Cricket Club is still in pretty good shape, members heard at the AGM on Tuesday, November 24th.

The bad weather hugely disrupted this summer's fixture list and had a consequent effect on revenue, particularly bar takings.

Chairman Guy Garland said: "It was dire season. In more than 30 years playing cricket I haven't seen a summer like it. But the few social functions we managed to run stood us in good stead."

On the playing side, the 1st XI managed to stay in Division One of the Cotswold Hills League after a difficult season, while the Seconds promised much but failed to gain promotion. However, they will play in Division Six next year.

One of the highlights of Ashton's season was the Under-16 team winning their league after an unbeaten summer, while the Under-12s won half their games. The Under-14s failed to win a game but ran the opposition close on more than one occasion, said junior coach

Dave Whitehouse. Another high point was when the club welcomed a new president, Bill Shirra, who has already had a positive impact and become heavily involved in the life of the club.

The club always welcomes new players and they are invited to turn up to pre-season nets at Prince Henry's High School cricket centre in Evesham, starting on Tuesday, March 12th, from 7pm-8pm.
