It's harvest time again and I get to have two rides on combine harvesters this year. One on a small combine with a 14-foot harvester and few of the mind-boggling mod cons of the newer models. The second ride was on a massive harvester, one with nearer a 35-foot crop cutter.

I was struck by what a solitary work farming is. Two tractors, one harvesting, one taking the grain to the barn every few passes when the tanks have filled. A wordless dance of understanding. The farmers have to be aware of each other, aware of the task, responding to one another in a simple choreography of service.

We saw a deer tentatively running out of the field. She knew that all the other fields had been harvested, where to hide in the mid-afternoon heat? I was delighted to hear the combine driver telling me that he had skirted around pheasants one time giving them time to escape. In my mind's eye I could see this bubble breaking out of the straight line of the harvest. All because of pheasants and a farmer who loves the land and the life it sustains.

Chatting with the farmer on my second ride, seeing the complex equipment for storing grain and keeping it dry and pest free, made me appreciate what a skilled and complex task all who farm have. As we stood in the stubble, I heard how hard it was going to be to judge planting this

year. Hours could be spent drilling; a bit of rain would cause the seed to germinate and more heat and dry could kill it off. Pray for the tough decisions needing to be made this year.

Stood in the heat of the stubble fields, I thought of what the Bible says about sowing and reaping:

- "... for whatever one sows, that will you also reap." Gal 6:7
- "... whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully..." 2 Cor 9:6f

Word which gives pause for thought.

Let us keep praying for our farms and farmers this harvest-tide.


NEWS FROM OVERBURY

In August, we resumed meetings in the Hall, having held the garden party in July. Our talk was suitably light and entertaining, with the title "Between Stairs, the life of a lady's maid". Jo Goulding had developed an interest in the life of women in the Edwardian era when she worked as a guide at Warwick Castle and based her



'Upstairs and Downstairs' with the aristocratic ladies, and many servants to help run the grand houses. In the hierarchy of the household, the lady's maid was privileged, although she worked very hard. She was at the beck and call of her mistress and had to have all her clothes ready and perfectly presented. She would have kept the hours of her lady, however late it might be, and have to get up early the next morning. She was often treated well and given presents.

Jo's first interest was in Daisy, Countess of Warwick, who was notorious in her day, (a mistress of Edward VII). She then found out more about some of the other grand titled ladies. A surprising number of them were American heiresses; the deal seemed to be that they had the money, if not the class, and the gentlemen had the titles. She referenced the fictional Cora, Lady Grantham of 'Downton Abbey' as being a realistic character, though many marriages were not happy. Jo's second chosen lady was Mary Curzon, and American who married Viscount Curzon, the future Vice-Roy of India. Her maid, Violet, was from the Black Country, and had worked as a skilled seamstress. When Mary Curzon died, Lord Curzon remarried and so Violet left her position. She herself later married and ran a small shop with her husband. Jo's talk was full of anecdotes, and she had brought along a collection of items to illustrate her stories. She told us horrendous tales of corsets and the 18 inch waist and explained the 'language of fans'. We all had a chance to try out the techniques of showing interest, flirting, and cutting someone dead! It was all good fun.

Dates coming up include Ashton Fete on 10th September. We will run the Tombola again, so filled jars for the children are required, as well as bottles etc. The Fete committee wants to make this a special occasion after a gap of a few years. Sue Cranham reported that Ashton has received funding for improvements to the old tennis courts with new provision for netball. Many of us attended Mollie Groom's funeral on 11th August. ...... Remembering Mollie Groom

Mollie was a great stalwart of Ashton WI and had so many friends amongst different generations of us. I have been sent many good and fond memories of her, and no doubt there will be many more.

I think almost the last occasion we saw Mollie was at the summer "Covid" Garden Party in 2020; it was quite hot, but she sat in the high –backed chair indoors in my Conservatory, taking in the atmosphere from the garden, the chatter and the familiar faces, enjoying the cup of tea and cake a procession of people brought over to her. It was the company she loved of course and being part of the occasion.

To many members, Mollie will be for ever associated with her stirring playing of "Jerusalem" to open the WI meetings. She played on the (awful) Village Hall piano – she didn't like the new electronic one. Mollie was a fine musician who loved playing and made her own arrangements; she played by ear and when her sight was failing it gave her pleasure to continue to play. For many years she played at Chapel services and also spent an afternoon at Bricklehampton Hall playing for the residents. But of course, this is just one picture and there was a lot more to Mollie than the elderly lady in the hat and coat.

Mollie always had a good sense of fun and could be quite saucy. At Committee meetings way back, they recall her making them all laugh so much that one can't recall how any business ever got done. Mollie was a sociable person, always joining WI outings when she could; she played for a sing song of war time songs at our 75th birthday celebration when she made us all join in. "Come on ladies!"

There was a WI project in the 1990s to twin up with another WI. Mollie helped set up a partnership with the WI in Ashton Keynes near Cirencester, and the link is still going strong.

Another side of Mollie was that she could be very determined even into her latter years. She was tall and spare and took a healthy walk round the village every day and back up the steep slope to Gorse Hill. Unfortunately, this led one day to a bad fall and her losing the sight in one eye; her attitude was "well at least it was the bad eye — I've still got the good one, wasn't I lucky." A bad bout of pneumonia also affected Mollie's health —both Cindy and Judy were wonderful to her, and Mollie was very appreciative of their kindness.

Mollie stepped in once at a WI meeting when a speaker didn't turn up and gave a brilliant impromptu talk about her childhood in her beloved south Wales, Narberth in Pembrokeshire. Mollie was an only child, and the family sounded close and loving, and very supportive. When she was young her mother nursed her through a long period of sickness with lung problems. She mentioned the nurses lighting the fire in the hospital ward every morning. It may explain why Mollie was very careful to 'wrap up warm' throughout her life. The family business was in skilled cabinet making, with coffins the 'bread and butter side of it' as she once told me! After teacher training and three years in Germany, Mollie came to Evesham and married John. She taught in the area for many years. I'm sure she was a super teacher, ending her career at Sedgeberrow. She was once turned down for a Junior headship, being told "no, we feel the boys need a man". Well, Mollie would have accepted it, but it must have rankled.

In conclusion Mollie was warm and kind and generous-hearted. When asked about her teaching days and if she remembered any of her pupils Mollie said: "I loved them all" and she probably did. She loved people and they loved her.

...... Remembering David Morgan

David Lewis Morgan was born in Chepstow in 1936. His parents were schoolteachers, and he was the middle of three children. He described his upbringing as strict and within the Baptist Church, which made for a fairly austere childhood. Soon after the end of WW2 his father obtained a headship in the Welsh valleys and the family moved to Blaina Gwent. David attended Hafod-y-Ddol Grammar School and in 1954 he gained a place at Guy's Hospital to study medicine.

He loved living in Lambeth, enjoyed medical school to the full, playing in and supporting the Guy's Rugby Teams with his usual huge fervour and enthusiasm. In 1956 he met Julie and after a 4-year courtship, just 6 weeks after qualifying as a doctor, they were married in St Michael and All Angels Church, Bishops Cleeve, the village where Julie was born.

Moving to Portsmouth to do his Junior Hospital Posts, he seriously considered a career in "midder" (obstetrics) but was persuaded to join a busy GP practice in the city, primarily.... to manage the baby booming population of post-war Portsmouth. In these early years the hours were long and hard with many late-night calls often to home deliveries. Later under David's leadership the practice became a front-runner in the training of GPS.

David was an active member of the British Medical Association together with a variety of other roles including hospital dermatology, medical advisor to the Portsmouth Church of England's Adoption Society, factory doctor for the Gas Board and Smith's Crisp Factory. He also worked at HMP Portsmouth, which contained some very troubled inmates, mostly prisoners with a life sentence. He never judged them and always offered them the same respect and dignity which he gave to all his patients.

Retirement brought a move to Teddington, close to where Julie spent her childhood, and near to their younger son Tom and family, to be of support in a time of need. It was to be 15 years of great contentment,

interspersed with tragedy on the deaths of a much-loved daughter-in-law, and son-in-law. His was the strength which helped the family through such difficult times, a rock and a guiding light.

Never happier than in his garden, playing the odd round of golf, entertaining family and friends, holidaying in Wales, his was a life positively lived to the very end. A unique man, a generous and charming friend, an inspirational doctor and a wonderful husband, father and grandfather.

The Teddington Flower Club meets every month at the village hall and has done so for a number of years now. It is run by a Teddington resident, Wendy Lawrence, who has been an accomplished demonstrator of flower arranging at venues throughout Gloucestershire and beyond. Wendy kindly offered to stage a demonstration at the Village Hall with the proceeds being donated to the Village Hall Committee's Maintenance Fund, Around 55 ladies attended the event and they thoroughly enjoyed watching Wendy produced 10 very creative and attractive arrangements which were then raffled in a prize draw. After the demonstration the ladies were treated to an afternoon tea of home-made sandwiches and cakes prepared by members of the Village Hall committee. The amount raised from event ticket sales and the raffle tickets was £640.00 and the committee has already earmarked this valuable contribution for its future expenditure plans.

The members of the committee are grateful to Wendy for generously giving her time and skills towards making the event such an enjoyable experience and financial success.

Dear Friends of Catch

The CATCH team wants you to know that we continue to serve the children and families in Mzamomhle. During this time many NGOs like ours have had to close their doors. The world is in turmoil and we hope that you and your family are well and safe. The purpose of this half year report/newsletter is to let you know what's being going on at CATCH since the new year dawned. First off, we have to thank God for keeping us going and for the support you have already given. CATCH has continued with its usual activities. However, our Food Gardens have progressed beyond our expectations and we have a new program called "Child at Heart". The CATCH primary aim of all our activities is to break the poverty trap in which the children live in Mzamomhle. Hunger is rising so we continue to feed the children. But we want to create a hunger in their minds for a better future. With the current chaos, high unemployment and all the social ills which surround the children, they need to be strong and resilient and hold on to a hope which will bring them security, health and peace. One out of every third child in our programs has been sexually abused. This past trauma can prevent their recovery into a successful future.

Our new program is a long-term intervention to break the poverty barrier. CATCH is reaching into 30 informal creches in Mzamomhle with an intervention aimed to bring an early learning experience to hundreds of children who attend these creches. The creches are often held in small shacks and have no equipment. The creches are owned and will remain with owners who are usually women seeking a way of earning income. CATCH will not own the creches but is working to train the owners to deliver a full and proper early learning curriculum. Statistics show that children are not ready to enter Grade R, the start of formal school. They are not up to the required standard by Grade 4 and start to drop out of school. Minister Blade Nzimande recently said that out of 100 children who enter primary school only 20 proceed to tertiary education. Then only 6 young people graduate successfully.

I hope you can watch our gardening video on You Tube https://youtu.be/ nOJzxuVfARc CATCH now has 165 mothers each working an organic garden. The aim is to boost the nutrition of their children. Some mothers also sell their produce. CATCH provides the seedlings, compost and ongoing training. With the serious crisis of hunger in Africa and even in our area these vegetables help to provide the nutrition the children need. In order to sustain this Project, CATCH has a large greenhouse where we grow herbs. The greenhouse is worked by the CATCH staff. The herbs are sold to retailers. We make a small profit from these sales but hope to also grow vegetables for further sales.

CATCH has purchased an incubator for chickens. We will soon start incubating 2000 eggs at a time. When these produce little chickens we will


